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## RENEWAL WEEKEND IN NAWANKOMPE, UGANDA, NOVEMBER 17-18

By the Rev. Peter Maganda, Dean, Eastern District, Lutheran Church of Uganda: "I am happy to send you a report about the LLR Weekend in Nawankompe community. I was not able to attend the Saturday program in the community, but I delegated a vicar who is serving the church there and he used the LLR materials. I joined them on Sunday for a worship service and later Christians continued to discuss their spiritual growth in church, at home and in their communities. This event was meaningful to me as I witnessed Christians sharing their faith with one another. This was such an event that enabled Christians to share their hardships in marriages, widows would as well share their challenges as in the photo below:



The widow standing in the photo above was invited by her daughter for the LLR weekend in Nawankompe. She walked on foot crossing two big communities to the church. It is in this event in Nawankompe that I also continued to realize the impact of LLR Weekends in the lives of the people. For after service, Christians shared their spiritual affairs in their homes, church and community. Here below was Sarah who moved tears to the church but who as well became an encouragement to the church:



Sarah is living in a second marriage after the first husband's death. Her current husband is a Muslim who does not allow her to attend church, she only escapes with her six children to attend Nawankompe Lutheran Church. Sarah full of tears said that her husband does not allow her to attend any church and yet himself does not even attend any mosque. The husband before was a Christian and she would have not married him if she had known his intention to change to Islam.

She however encouraged the fellow women who would be in the same situation to remain strong in faith, professing the name of Christ Jesus right from their homes. But Sarah was not having any platform where she would freely share such challenges until the LLR Weekend in Nawankompe.

In the photo above she had finished sharing and we moved in groups of two and three people to pray for each other. I was much humbled as well when she asked me what I wanted to be prayed for, and indeed she did pray for me, something that is very rare from Christians in my Deanery. #### FUNDS NEEDED FOR MISSION IN UGANDA

At the invitation of Bishop Charles Bameka and Dean Peter Maganda, our Executive Director, Bill Oehlschlager, will be traveling to Uganda January 11-21. Rev. Peter has invited the pastors/evangelists and heads of laity from 40 congregations in the Eastern District deanery to attend three days of training on Lutheran Lay Renewal's weekend program, to be held at the Lutheran Theological College in Magamaga. Three very successful Lutheran Lay Renewal weekends were held in the Eastern District in the fall and Rev. Peter is convinced that these renewal weekends will be very helpful in growing congregations and building Christian community in his deanery. Bill also has been invited to meet with Bishop Charles Bameka and the Eastern District Deanery Council, as well as visit some of the congregations in the deanery.

This is a very exciting opportunity for LLR, one of the most exciting in our 47-year history, but it also creates a need for additional funding, as we will be paying for most of the cost of the three-day training session, as well as Bill's travel expenses. Additional funds are greatly needed. Please pray about you and/or your congregation offering financial support to help our Christian brothers and sisters grow the Lutheran Church of Uganda, and please also pray for Our Lord's blessings on the LCU and on our mission there in January. #### THE CHURCH TAKES AN UNFORTUNATE TURN

In the fourth century the Christian church took a turn that still handicaps traditional churches today. The Roman emperor made Christianity the official religion of the Empire. Most consider this a good development. Christianity then took on explosive growth. I consider it an unfortunate turn. We old-line churches carry a legacy that weakens our effectiveness in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

As the Roman Empire grew, so did the number of officials needed to administer it. Before the fourth century Christians were mostly excluded from the bureaucracy. Once the Emperor gave preference to Christianity, then joining the state church was the smart move for citizens with ambition. Much of that explosive growth was made up of people who were Christians for convenience rather than by conviction. Pastors and bishops were exempted from tax obligations. The temptation to seek this status without conviction must have been great.

Mainline churches today had state-church backgrounds before they expanded into North America. If you lived in a geographic area, you were Anglican, or Lutheran, or Presbyterian/Reformed (but mostly Catholic). The only alternative was to renounce that faith, which was often considered an act of treason. This approach produced many passive Christians who did just enough to meet their minimum obligation.

I read once of a Lutheran pastor in a German village who decided that fathers really should show up for the baptism of their child. So he would send out a policeman to drag the father to church for that occasion. Imagine what that state church arrangement did for the attitudes of those pastors? If you can compel, why bother to attract? With attendance expected, why bother to figure out how to make the biblical word relevant to the hearers?

Reported numbers are an interesting reflection of differing ways to organize church life. For old-line churches 1,000 members usually means an average worship attendance of about 300. For many Evangelical and Pentecostal churches 1,000 attendance means membership of perhaps 300. Which way of reporting do you think reflects a more dynamic congregation?

Since the fourth century Christian churches have had to deal with at least two tiers of members: those who are passively meeting social expectations and those who are convicted and even passionate about living out the Christian life. Traditional churches don't have a vocabulary to sort out the difference.

Whether someone lives the faith passively or passionately does not affect their eternal status before God. By his grace God accepts all who confess Jesus Christ as their Savior. God does not look for evidence that someone really, really, really believes or has exactly the right details of doctrinal understanding. In fact, Jesus says that unless you have the faith of a child you cannot enter the kingdom of God.

When I planted a church twenty-five years ago, I tried out a distinction between participants and partners. Anybody who came with some regularity was listed in our directory as a participant. Anybody who accepted responsibility to support and lead the congregation was a partner. Most participants were passive. Most partners were passionate. Partnership did not imply the others were not true Christians.

A distinction that held up to the Reformation was between religious and others, called laity. Fifty years ago in mainline churches those who claimed to speak in tongues produced considerable church conflict when others in the congregation inferred they were now second-class citizens. Rather than work with the categories of conviction and convenience, I want to promote the category of stages of growth in the faith, with the invitation to all to grow to a more fulfilling stage. We have to look to the Holy Spirit for such growth. All can pray for more of his fruit. – The Rev. David Luecke, Ph. D., LLRA Board Member

He gave us a vision for ministry that showed us that just being busy with serving on committees and doing other necessary and practical things important to the life of our congregations, is not enough. It should always be a work of faith and an act of faith. He also opened to us very simple ways we can reach out to our communities and do evangelism in day to day activities, like speaking with people in public at the grocery store or the gas station. When we ask people how they are doing to really mean it and take time to show interest in their lives. One thing, in particular that I remember is how Bill told us that when we tell someone we will pray for them to take it one step further and to pray with them right then and there.
